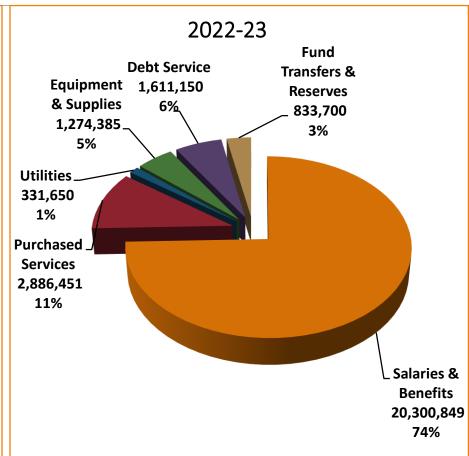

# 23-24 Governor's Budget Proposal for Pre-K-12 Education

Basic Education Funding - \$567 Million increase

- New \$567 million BEF allocated by BEF formula
- NESD \$528,453 (5.60%)
- BEF formula 23-24 spreadsheets are not final 4 factors yet to be determined

Special Education Funding - \$104 Million increase

- NESD \$80,416 (6.00%)
- SEF formula 23-24 spreadsheets are not final 22-23 Act 1 reports will be filed by October 2023. 22-23 SEF is still not finalized.

BEF & SEF proposals have a chance of making it, but some amounts might be diverted to Level Up, etc. that will not benefit NESD.

# 23-24 Governor's Budget Proposal Pre-K-12 Education Increases

Ready to Learn Grant - level funded

Pupil Transportation – level funded

PSERS & Social Security Reimbursement – level funded

Early Childhood Programs

- Pre-K Counts \$30 Million
- Head Start \$3 Million
- Early Intervention \$10.4 Million

PCCD Safety & Security Grants - \$100 million - competitive?

School Mental Health Support Grants - \$100 million - NESD - \$116,633

# 23-24 Governor's Budget Proposal Pre-K-12 Education Increases

School Environmental Repairs and Improvement Grants

Expands existing work with DEP and PENNVEST - \$100 million – competitive?

Continuation of universal free breakfast - \$38.5 million

#### Other Policy....

- Increase minimum wage to \$15/hour
- \$24.7 million in job retention and recruitment efforts for teachers, police and nurses
- Expansion of Property Tax/Rent Rebate program for 2024-25

However, the house and senate have proposed bills in various stages that may address some of these issues.

#### Federal Funding Sustainability

- 2024 President's Proposed Budget (10/1/23 to 9/30/24)
  - Title I is proposed with a 12.0% increase
  - IDEA is proposed with a 14.3% increase
  - Access to high quality preschool, mental health supports, fullservice community schools and critical educator shortages are additional priorities impacting K-12 education
- 2023 Federal Budget (10/1/22 to 9/30/23)
  - Approved December 29, 2022
  - Title I increased 4.6%
  - IDEA increased 19.2%

#### Federal Funding - Pandemic Grants in Progress until September 30, 2024

- ESSER III
  - \$78,920 remaining for mental health expenditures
- ARP 7% ESSER
  - \$8,000 remaining for staff professional development
  - \$12,000 remaining for after school tutoring

#### Closing the Gap

- Projected Use of Fund Balance \$1,287,586
  - PDE BEF/SEF?
    - 50% of proposed is approximately \$304,435
  - Expenditure Cuts
  - Local Real Estate Tax Increase
    - Act 1 Index Limit (2023-24) 5.9%
    - 5.85% \$508,300 \$84 per \$100,000 assessed value
    - 4.94% \$429,600 \$71 per \$100,000 assessed value
    - 3.97% \$344,900 \$57 per \$100,000 assessed value
    - 2.99% \$260,200 \$43 per \$100,000 assessed value
